



CLOROX HAS A LONG, PROUD HISTORY OF COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT

Since it began in 1980, The Clorox Company Foundation has awarded more than \$70 million in cash grants to organizations in K-12 education, youth development and cultural and civic enrichment. Our giving is focused in our headquarters and operating areas because we believe in supporting the communities where we work and live as well as the causes that our employees hold most dear. But how much cash we give is only part of the story. It is the involvement of Clorox employees in our communities that leverages those monetary contributions to really make a difference.

We support our employee volunteer efforts. Any Clorox employee volunteering at least 24 hours of their time to a U.S. nonprofit during a year can

apply to receive a grant for that organization. Many Clorox employees generously give of their own money, and we support that, too. Annually we match up to \$2,500 per employee for his/her contributions to nonprofit organizations and up to an additional \$5,000 per employee to eligible U.S. higher education programs.

We also provide product donations to communities in need. Working closely with the American Red Cross and other international relief organizations, Clorox donates bleach, trash bags and other Clorox products to disaster stricken areas for use in cleanup and sanitization. In the spring and summer of 2008 alone, we donated fourteen truckloads of Clorox® bleach and more than 16,000

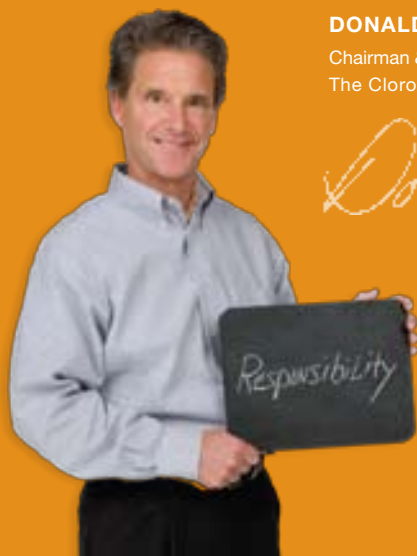
Glad® trash bags to areas in the U.S. Midwest hit by tornadoes and disastrous flooding.
